What is the meaning of your pattern and how many movements does it have?

Explain what is happening on the second movement of your pattern?

Why do the jump and spin within you pattern?

Give a brief history of Tae Kwon-Do including all the significant dates

What is the Korean for flying side kick and why use it within your pattern?

Which patterns do jumping movements appear?

What points should be considered when performing a pattern?

What is the Korean for twin upwards palm heel block and what is its purpose?

What is the Korean for reverse knifehand strike and where are you hitting?

What is the difference between a punch, strike and a thrust?

What does the colour Black signify?

How do you think Tae Kwon-Do differs from other Martial Arts?

What is the Korean for Breaking and what is its purpose?

Why do we perform patterns?

What the difference between a coloured belt and a black belt?

Remember that these are just examples of questions you might be asked at a grading, a student should have a good knowledge of their theory before going to grade.
